What are the laws protecting these communities? What are institutions doing to support human rights?	<b>Sarah Sinclair</b> Lawyer, EAGLE LAW	Canada's approach to the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (“UNDRIP”)	This workshop explores issues of Indigenous rights and how they affect all Canadians, especially young people. In addition to a discussion of some of the myths we have all heard (such as the myth that all Indigenous people get free housing and free university educations) this workshop will discuss the following questions: What is UNDRIP? Why won't the Canadian government make UNDRIP a part of Canadian law, and why is that important? Why are Indigenous people given special rights in Canada? How do these issues affect young Canadians?
